# Sandoval County Clerk improves record keeping and election operations

The <u>Sandoval County Clerk's</u> <u>Office</u> provides a wide variety of government services. It's the office you visit for marriage licenses or other permits. It's where you start if you wish to run for elected office and where you go for all things concerning elections.

The Office receives and records legal documents on Sandoval County property including deeds, maps, plats, or transfers. The Clerk also administers oaths and affirmations and receives process against the County.

The County's Bureau of Elections, a critical part of the Clerk's office, is responsible for conducting all federal, state and County elections.

#### **ACCOMPLISHMENTS**

- Developed Job Aids for uniformity in compliance with State Statute for every function in the Records Division.
- 90% complete with the Digitization project of Marriage Licenses.
- Developed Cash Handling Procedures and trained staff.
- Staff is attending training and weekly coaching for quality improvement.
- Corrected UCC recording fees and plats to be in compliance with State Statute.
- Negotiating electronic records transfer for companies purchasing the records via FTP.
- Implemented a ticketing system to better serve the Constituents doing business at the Office.
- Implemented a sign-in process at the Bureau of Elections warehouse to be compliant with State Statute
- Surveillance Cameras will be installed at the Bureau of Elections Warehouse this fiscal year.
- Began outreach with Native American leadership within the County.

# Sandoval County Bureau of Elections Warehouse gets new camera system



BERNALILLO – It's been a long time coming, but now after nearly a decade, the Sandoval County Bureau of Elections Warehouse is getting a new surveillance camera system.

According to Sandoval County Clerk, Anne Brady-Romero, this should've been in place many years ago. "We are just beginning to catch up where we need to be as a Class A County," she said. "This is the kind of thing I wanted to make sure got done when I was elected into office."

Brady-Romero said she wanted to push for this initiative after Sandoval County Commissioner F. Kenneth Eichwald said he wanted the county elections to be "Crystal Clear".

"This is how we take that first step to adhere to his wishes," she said.

Seven surveillance cameras are currently being installed on the inside of the BOE Warehouse, with five more being installed on the exterior of the building.

The cost for this project was over \$32,000 and will take several days to complete.

"Increasing election security is a priority for my office and this project is one of the first projects, I am overseeing" she said.

# What does PRESS New Mexico stand for?

PRESS New Mexico addresses all social injustice issues and works to keep the attention on the true and one enemy—white supremacy ideology.

We strive to take care of our community at the ground level. We have passed out toiletry items and food to our houseless members, distributed emergency blankets during the winter, sponsored multiple programs/events to support our local community, and partnered with ACLU New Mexico to end qualified immunity.

# What was your inspiration to start PRESS New Mexico?

The inspiration for PRESS New Mexico came from a need for one organization to just help our oppressed people and fight for what is right. We want to be a safe place for our BIPOC, LGBTQ+, AAPI, and Latinx community, and all those who are affected by white supremacy.

We will win once we all band together and realize that we are what New Mexico and the rest of America look like and that we are the true majority!

# What drives you to be a community leader?

I know what it is like to feel helpless, but I also know how to lead and serve others. I grew up experiencing multiple levels of abuse and food insecurity. I was in six different foster homes and eventually ended up running away to the U.S.Air Force with nothing but the clothes I had on. I went on to serve 20

years in the military where I experienced combat and ended up retiring here in New Mexico.

Upon making New Mexico my home, I realized that while we are a minority-majority state, "minorities" often do not have a voice here. Our local government should look like us, but right now it does not. We demand to be seen and heard, and we will demand effective change that includes everyone.

# What is the ultimate goal of PRESS New Mexico?

Our ultimate goal is to not be needed. New Mexico has ended qualified immunity and legalized recreational marijuana. We have a unique opportunity to lead the way on what it is like to live as a community in the true sense of the word.

BIPOC, LGBTQ+, AAPI, Latinx, and all other residents of New Mexico deserve a fair opportunity at just being human! This is all we want, a chance to live and be human, to truly live as equals and stop the nonsense division

that has kept us from achieving this for so many decades. The time for change is NOW.

# Do you believe we have made changes needed for New Mexico?

New Mexico is ready for real change. We have started to change in some areas, but we must PRESS ON. We need statewide accountability for use of force, and we need to keep the newly passed Black Education Act on our radar. We need to demand that our government offices, council members, and school board officials represent the people of New Mexico—that is ALL people from every different background.

Our government should seek out qualified members from all backgrounds so decisions, will be in everyone's best interest, not that of a select few. We need to stop with the symbolism of change and seek change that will better the lives of New Mexicans everywhere.

# What are you working on right now?

We are working with the ACLU to seek statewide accountability for use of force. We are monitoring the New Mexico Black Education Act to ensure that every school does its due diligence to implement the act's important changes including seeking out and removing biased members from the public school system. We are also working on a long-term project for our houseless members.

## Saving Water for a Healthy New Mexico

### **Help Protect this Vital Resource**

New Mexico is primarily a desert landscape, and water is a vital limited resource

that we all need to protect and share.

Our surface waters in New Mexico originate primarily from rain and melting snow, yet over 95 percent of surface water evaporates. That means that about 95 percent of New Mexico's fresh water comes from underground sources like aquifers, where water occupies small spaces below ground between sand and gravel and rock.

Our underground water sources cannot be cleaned once they are contaminated, which is why it is essential for the health of New Mexicans that the water in our underground aquifers is kept

free of contamination from fracking and other chemicalladen processes.

Water drawn out of our underground aquifers for household use is replenished by surface waters seeping down, which is why it is essential that they are kept uncontaminated as well.

New Mexico's dry climate and persistent drought conditions mean we must all use water wisely. At the same time, opportunities for reuse of highly treated wastewater are being created, which are overseen by the Office of the State Engineer.

We all must equitably share the limited fresh water we have, balancing the needs of non-polluting businesses that support our economy and every New Mexican household. The EPA estimates that the average American household uses 82 gallons of water a day per person, more than 20% of which is wasted. The average family could save about 13,000 gallons annually just by installing WaterSense toilets! WaterSense faucets and shower heads can save households another 26,000 gallons of water every year.

Amazingly, water savings can be almost doubled further simply by conscientiously changing our personal habits! Using less water also saves on your electricity bill by heating less water!

Fresh water is a vital but limited resource, and we need to take responsibility for ensuring that all of our neighbors throughout New Mexico have enough of our precious limited supply of water.

Remember: Reducing water usage saves money.

### Save water, electricity, and money

- 1. **Toilets** flush an average of 20 gallon a day unless they are a highly efficient model. Put a brick in the tank to reduce the amount of water flushed away.
- 2. Energy Star washing machines use less water. Also, adjusting the amount of water for the size of each load of laundry can save hundreds of gallons of water a year.
- 3. **Water faucets** and **showerheads** can be replaced with low-flow models, saving 15 gallons of water for every 10-minute shower.
- 4. EnergyStar **dishwashers** are much more water efficient than handwashing, saving about 160 gallons of water annually. Letting your faucet run for five minutes can waste 10 gallons of water and use enough energy to power a 60W lightbulb for 18 hours.
- 5. **Yards** should be watered in the morning or late evening to minimize evaporation, and preferably on a drip system to avoid the up to 50% evaporation from sprinklers, which consume thousands of gallons a year.
- Defrost **food** in the fridge the day before instead of wasting hot water from your faucet.
- 7. Teach your family to be water conscious, by turning off the water while **brushing teeth** and **shaving**, saving the average household over 1,000 gallons of precious water and money, every year.



## **Local Volunteers Aid Asylees**

### Volunteers travel to border bringing needed supplies

A volunteer group of Albuquerque concerned citizens travel to El Paso/Juarez every month to take needed basic supplies to the asylum seekers (asylees) who cross over the border and legally petition for asylum. The asylees come from Guatemala, El Salvador, Mexico, and Honduras primarily, but also from Haiti and Brazil.

Currently needed items are baby formula, baby bottles, and sports bras (which are often taken from women by Customs and Border Patrol).

The volunteer group is formed into three teams who depend on donations of cash and requested supplies to fill their cars for the long trip down and back. Each trip involves deliveries of supplies to the shelters and discussing with the shelter staff the current changing immigration situation and supply needs.

Between each trip, the team members work locally to build awareness and gather the donations of requested supplies.



The teams work with Ruben Garcia who, in 1973, founded Annunciation House, a major shelter of three facilities that receives asylees and feeds, clothes, and nurtures them to help them on their journey to their US sponsors.

The journeys are often long bus trips, up to three days, to US cities where asylees are united with their sponsors often family members or friends, a church organization, or an unrelated compassionate individual.

## Miss Information

Corporations' avowed support for democracy quickly evaporated

Before last February, Miss Information had not set foot in her neighborhood Walmart. Her stance was a protest against Walmart's notoriously poor treatment of its employees. That changed in February when the New Mexico health department directed her husband—to his dismay—to report to Walmart for his covid vaccination. Even Walmart's disgraceful employment practices weren't going to deter Mr. Information from getting his vaccination.

We were consoled by a January New York Times article headlined, "Walmart joins companies suspending donations to lawmakers who voted against certifying the election."

But by April, Walmart had donated \$30,000 to the National Republican Campaign Committee (NRCC) and \$30,000 to the National Republican Senatorial Committee (NRSC), the two main Republican committees that support the 147 insurrectionist members of Congress, dubbed the Sedition Caucus.

And what about our neighbor, Intel? The month after announcing that it would stop PAC contributions to Sedition Caucus members, it sent \$15,000 to the NRCC, apparently finding its previous principled position inconvenient.

By February, the ethics watchdog CREW (Citizens for Responsibility and Ethics in Government) had identified nearly 190 companies that pledged to halt donations to Sedition Caucus lawmakers. These included Anheuser-Busch, AT&T, Boeing, Cigna Comcast, GE, iHeartMedia, Koch Industries, Oracle,

Pfizer, PNC Bank, Sanofi, and Walgreens. These companies and many others very quickly and quietly abandoned their commitment to withhold support from insurrectionists. Many others appear, so far, to be withholding their donations.

Tragically, many corporations find the corrosive practice of buying political access and influence to be more important than maintaining our democracy. That is the definition of a corrupt system.
