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Delegates select candidates for June primary

The Democratic Party of New Mexico held its Pre-Primary Convention in Roswell on March 5, 2022, and it

was, well, surreal!

The weekend started Saturday night with a fundraiser at the Anderson Museum of Contemporary Art. Democrats from all over the state mingled with one another before moving on to other kickoff events.

A campaign media vendor hosted cocktails at the Roswell Alien Museum where I met Michelle Sandoval, candidate for House District 57! People also packed in for candidate

determine who appears on the November ballot.

Gimme Some Truth

Part I

Wisdom for Democrats from Sen. Fred Harris

Fred Roy Harris was born in 1930 in Walters, Oklahoma. After graduating from University of Oklahoma Law School with distinction, Harris was elected to the Oklahoma State Senate in 1956. At age 25, Harris was the youngest State Senator in Oklahoma history. He remained the youngest senator for the eight years he served.

In 1964, Harris ran for and won a U.S. Senate seat for Oklahoma. While in the U.S. Senate, Harris was, among other things, the driving force for successful federal legislation directly affecting New Mexico: the legislation to return their 48,000-acre sacred “Blue Lake” land to the Taos Pueblo.

Harris served as Chairman of the Democratic National Committee in 1969 and 1970 and caused reform that brought full representation to women and minorities. In 1972, Harris left the U.S. Senate. In 1976, Harris sought the Democratic nomination for the presidency as part of his work for an “economic democracy” for the United States. Harris had a compelling populist appeal in politics.

In 1976, Harris came to the University of New Mexico to teach political science. On a sunny March afternoon, Judy Gordon and I traveled to Corrales to visit with him. We wanted his insights on youth in politics, money in politics, and the stories of politics.

Involving Young People in Politics

We asked Sen. Harris how he had come to politics at such a young age and what in his experience could be useful to galvanize youth participation in politics today.

First noted was the practical advice of Sen. Harris’s wife Margaret Elliston (Chair, Democratic Party of New Mexico, 2018-2020) to “hire them” when there is a campaign or political job available.



Secondly, Sen. Harris noted that youth can be difficult to organize and turn out for meetings. Often, this is because they do not have transportation or the time to take from studies or work.

Youth participation is vital to a forward-looking political party. Jimmy Carter pointed out the strong correlation between a person's age and likelihood of voting. Those in their twenties have only about a 20 percent rate of participating versus 60-year-olds' 60 percent rate.

Sen. Harris's ideas for involving youth include the following:

- Support and inspire a Young Democrats Club at a university, college, or high school by helping them meet officeholders on the federal, state, or local level.
- Invite youth to work in political campaigns.
- Watch for local news on young people's accomplishments and encourage a Democratic officeholder to send them a letter of recognition.
- Work with local civic clubs or high schools to sponsor an essay contest. Sen. Harris recalled chaperoning a trip to Washington, D.C. for the winners of an essay contest on "Why I Am a Democrat." The entire Oklahoma delegation met

for lunch with the young essayists.

- Offer recognition and honors to young people such as a party for newly elected class officers, or provide a luncheon, plaque, or other sign of recognition to honor a student's achievement.
- Work with a university, college, or high school to see if academic credits can be earned by students who work in campaigns or for a political party.

Were You Well Known and Well Financed When First Entering Politics?

Sen. Harris assured us that he had "no money" when he first ran for a state senate seat at age 25. You couldn't buy advertising without money, so Harris won his seat by talking to and organizing people.

Then, running for the U.S. Senate, he went to **every** town in Oklahoma and talked to people. He organized

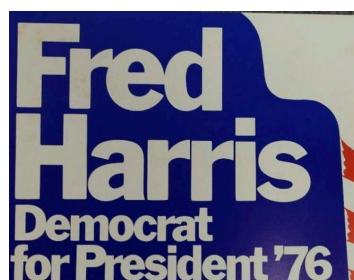
meetings in each town and had a campaign committee chair in each town. He asked for volunteers in each town.

Sen. Harris believes that volunteers in a campaign are the same as, or even better than, money. The volunteers help build the connections—and they vote.

To prepare to run for office, a candidate needs to build many connections with voters. This can be done by getting involved in civic affairs. For example, Harris became a volunteer lobbyist for the PTA.

After the Supreme Court ruling in *Brown v. Board of Education*, Harris met with Black parents to reassure them their children would be safe in the state's newly integrated schools.

Vote Yes for Kids Campaign

Early childhood education is on the November ballot

Hard-working, activist Democrats joined the DPSC Zoom session last month to learn more about the constitutional amendment to increase funding for early childhood education.

The amendment will be on the November ballot. "VOTE YES FOR KIDS" is the official name of the campaign.

Headlined by opening remarks from Lt. Gov. Howie Morales, the program detailed the long and arduous history of getting the amendment on the ballot, its crucial importance to New

Mexico's children, and how the money will be used. He also identified actions we can take to support a YES vote.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT FOR EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION

The proposed constitutional amendment would approve a 1.25% withdrawal annually from the Land Grant Permanent Fund, valued at around \$20 billion. Most of the funds would go to early childhood education, with some going toward the public-school permanent fund. If passed, it would mean increased funding for education of approximately \$250 million each year.

Other speakers included Rep. Antonio (Mo) Maestas; Rep. Javier Martinez; Andrea Serrano, Executive Director, OLÉ NM; James Jimenez, NM Voices for Children Action Fund; Eric Griego, Center for Civic Action; Whitney Holland, State President, AFT, and Bethany

Jarrell, State Vice President NEA.

Each speaker provided key insights into the process for the amendment's passage and

why it is so important to our state.

U.S. Cable Subscribers Fund Russian Propaganda

Russia has silenced independent media, and journalists are fleeing the country. The Russian people have virtually no access to fact-based, objective reporting.

But lest you fear that Russians aren't hearing Western voices, rest assured this is not the case. Russian media outlets are being directed to broadcast clips of Fox News host Tucker Carlson. So says a 12-page Russian-language memo obtained by [Mother Jones](#). Produced by a Russian security agency, the memo advises Russian broadcasters to highlight the vile rantings of Carlson, saying it is "essential" to do so.

That the Russian government is smitten with Carlson's rantings is not surprising.

What could be more persuasive than an American "journalist" falsely pointing fingers at the United States and NATO for provoking Russia's invasion of Ukraine and promoting the conspiracy theory that the U.S. funds Ukrainian bioweapons labs? It is particularly galling that cable subscribers are forced to subsidize this agitprop.

The neo-Nazi Daily Stormer has called Carlson "literally our greatest ally." Carlson has famously lost many of his sponsors because of his odious views on White nationalism, the Big Lie, January 6, vaccinations, Russia, Putin, and more. Yet, he stays on the air spewing lies and hate without restraint.

Carlson can do this because cable subscribers—you and I—pay a large chunk of his bloated \$6 million annual

salary even if we never turn on Fox News. This is because news outlets receive a fee to be carried by cable companies. The fee is passed on to cable subscribers, who shovel over an estimated \$1.8 billion annually to Fox. Individual subscribers pay an average of about \$1.72 per month. Although Fox News viewers comprise less than 5 percent of households with cable, Fox's fees are higher than most because the network attracts the largest cable news audience.

Can we purchase a cable package without Fox News? To date, we must subsidize this dangerous network even if we only subscribe to a basic package.

Cable companies are on the defensive, however. Between 2018 and 2021, they lost nearly 20 million subscribers. With increasing numbers of subscribers cutting the cord, cable operators may be forced to respond by offering more flexibility.

Cord cutting and demanding a cable package without Fox News are our weapons of choice against Fox's onslaught of authoritarian messages and disinformation.

We must take these actions in sufficient numbers to convince cable providers that a network whose mission is to undermine democracy is not what the American people want and is no longer good for business.
